SOCIETY NAME CHANGE VOTE BARELY MISSES

By a narrow margin, the vote to change the name of the Clan Little Society, USA, Ltd. to the Clan Little Society, North America, Ltd. was defeated. The vote narrowly failed to achieve the 67% approval as required by Georgia state law. Oddly enough, all ballots returned were marked in favor of the name change. The vote's failure can be attributed to the fact that the ballots were attached to CLSUSA membership renewal forms that were distributed during a late campaign to encourage members who hadn't done so to renew their memberships for the 1997 - 1998 year. Members who had renewed earlier in the year and did not send in the late renewal forms also didn't vote in the name change referendum, thus causing the measure to fail.

On a positive note, the late membership drive and name change ballot has helped us get a better handle on the number of individual and family memberships in the society. We currently have 110 memberships: 77 individual and 33 family.
