Members forwarded 59 proxies to Society officers, enabling a quorem so that important Society business could be officially conducted.

One of those business items was the selection of the location for the Year 2001 AGM, which is to be held the Saturday of the Labor Day weekend at the Pleasanton, CA Highland Games. This meeting will be very important because the main agenda item will be the election of Society officers for the following two years. Both Richard Holt, Society President, and Ross Little. Vice President, have indicated they would like to step down, so participation in person or by proxy will be very important. The 2001 AGM was originally going to be held in Pennsylvania, but the lack of a NE USA commissioner to host the event necessitated choosing an alternate site.



Report From Scotland: The Grand Millenium Gathering

Scotland and NA Clan Society Members From Around the World Meet in Dumfries

DUMFRIES, SCOTLAND – A small group of members from both the Scotland and the North America Clan Little Societies met in Dumfries, Scotland over the July 7-9, 2000 weekend. Hosted by Dr. Johnnie Little, founder of the Scotland Society, the event was originally scheduled to include a guided tour, formal dinner, and information roundtable featuring ancient Clan Little genealogy. However, due to unexpected illness in the family, Dr. Johnnie reluctantly scaled back the affair to a simple tea at his home on Sunday afternoon, July 9th.

A small group of attendees (including your Reiver Editor and son) stayed at the Crichton University College. A small dinner at the college on Friday evening let everyone relax and get to know one another. The next day, a small band of hardy adventurers went on a self-guided tour of the traditional Little Clan lands of Eskdale and Ewesdale. Printed directions with an extensive list of sights to see were provided by Dr. Johnnie. Highlights included visiting Robert The Bruce's castle (in ruins), lunching at the Reiver's Rest in Langholm (where Peter Lytle sampled the haggis), and visiting Miekledale. home of the last Clan chief. Also visited were several cemeteries with Little headstones dating back into the mid-1600's the site of an ancient Roman fort, and several even more ancient stone circles

On the final day, Dr. Johnnie and his wife hosted an informal tea at his home on Fernhill outside Dumfries. Dr. Johnnie had on display his outstanding genealogical materials detailing the Littles through history from Scotland and England all the way back to Sweden in the earliest centuries of the First Millenium. Although small, it was a gathering to be remembered!

Dickey of Atlanta, GA, who then completed all ancillary legal work. The Articles will be filed with the Georgia Secretary of State after receiving the required Society Officer signatures.
