The following article has been extracted from an original story " A Little Story: 200 years of American Tradition" written by Ken Levy and published as an article in the Yucaipa News Mirror. Mr. Levy also took the accompanying photo.

Eight generations of Littles in America have culminated in a return to early roots. Robert Little is of Scottish and Irish decent. David and Sarah Little came to Virginia from Ireland in 1772. The family moved to Ohio and Indiana and thereafter to Missouri and Nebraska. They settled there until Robert's father brought his branch of the family to California in 1936. David and Sarah Little fed American Revolutionary troops by way of milling their own flour. Robert, our subject, spent much of his career as a finish carpenter .He served as a California State Guardsman from his high school days, thereafter serving in the U.S. Army during World War II with tours of duty in New Guinea and the Philippines. Robert worked for the Federal Government at Norton Air Force Base from 1951 until his retirement when he moved his family back to Yucaipa, CA.

Robert Little has taken a strong approach to reliving the days of America's fur trading mountain men. Robert, as the photo vividly shows, certainly looks and acts the part. As often as possible he lives it too, from the handcrafting of early American tools, clothing and accessories, to the twice yearly re-enactment of the mountain man's way of life in Oak Glen, CA. Mountainman organizations meet all across America bringing together reenactors to the lifestyle of their ancestors. A mixture of eras reenacted is called free trappers. They meet in Holcomb Valley, CA where they set up tents, prepare small fires, and live life as it would have been in that era. Contests are set up to test skills in shooting and ax and knife throwing. Reenactors make all their own period tools, clothing and accessories, or carry those made for them. In emulation of that, Robert Little has made an impressive assortment of mountain-man gear, all as authentic as possible to that era, about 1780.

There's a great deal more that can be said about mountainman life. Robert Little discourses at length about how clothing was made and the significance of various and sundry accessories worn by these men: leather neck chokers worn to protect a person from a surprise attack from the rear to cut one's throat and to keep a man from nodding asleep when watchfulness was critical, and rabbit skins and tails hanging from hats to act as fly


